



Over the past weeks we have learned some fascinating truths from the Bible. We have learned that Jesus, God Himself, bore our sins and died for us on the cross, and that through faith in

Church leaders showed favoritism towards Jewish widows at the expense of Gentile widows. (Acts 6:1). Even Paul had problems getting along with his co-workers Barnabas and John Mark. (Acts. 15:36-39).

Now, what is the point of all this? It is to tell you that God is perfect, but God's people are not. That is why throughout these meetings we have been pointing you to Jesus and His Word, the Bible. The truths you have learned have come from the Bible, not from a person. The Word of God will endure forever. (1

Pet. 1:24-25) And because we have learned these truths, many are getting ready to be baptized and to join the Seventh-day Adventist church. And again I say, God bless you. Welcome to the family of God.

TAKE-HOME MESSAGE

As a member of the church, we must always keep our eyes on Jesus – for He alone is perfect. He alone will not disappoint us. Jesus told a parable in which he taught us that the church would not be perfect – but that one day, He would separate the wheat from the weeds. That separation is His work. (Matt. 13:24-30) Until then, keep your eyes fixed on Jesus who alone is the author and finisher of your faith! (Heb. 12:1-2).
